After 42 years of employment with the BNSF Railroad in Sweetwater and in Saginaw, he retired in 1991 as an assistant train master. Taylor proudly served in the U.S. Army and Army Reserves retiring as a colonel. During his active duty with the army, he was stationed at Ft. Benning, GA serving in Germany and Okinawa. At the end of the Viet Nam War, he was an area Commander at Ft. Chaffee, Arkansas, and was responsible for placing many refugees from Viet Nam in Homes throughout the U.S. But, Taylor's most important job was being our hero.
